Global

Confirmed coronavirus cases surpassed 97 million, with deaths at 2.09 million.

- Three mutant variants of the coronavirus that emerged in Britain, South Africa and Brazil pose a high risk in Europe and will lead to more COVID-19 infections, hospitalizations and deaths, Europe's disease surveillance agency assessed, recommending that countries "should prepare their healthcare systems for a further escalation in demand."
- Three new laboratory studies are raising concerns that the **immune response** triggered by a COVID-19 infection or vaccination may be less effective at protecting against the new strain of the coronavirus that first emerged in South Africa.
- Eli Lilly said its antibody drug prevented many COVID-19 infections among nursing home staff and residents.



COVID-19 Vaccine


Globally, 56.58 million have received vaccinations as of Thursday, up from 53.8 million on Wednesday.

The US and China lead in total number of doses administered, 17.55 million and 15.00 million, respectively.

COVID-19 Vaccine

Pfizer and BioNTech have agreed to supply their COVID-19 vaccine to the WHO colled COVAX vaccine access scheme.

- Expanding its vaccine diplomacy, China will provide Pakistan 500,000 doses of its Sinopharm vaccine for free by the end of January, with another 1.1 million to arrive in February.
- Hungary became the first EU country to approve Russia's Sputnik V vaccine.

 According to the WHO, Guinea is the sole lowincome country in Africa to receive vaccine doses, with only 25 people being inoculated so far. The Seychelles is the only African country to have started a national vaccination campaign.

Markets

Palm oil prices are near a decade high, as pandemic-related labor shortages in Indonesia and Malaysia have reduced production.

- **European stocks** fell on Friday, reversing almost all of its weekly gains after data showed euro zone business activity shrank in January.
- Asian-Pacific markets also edged down. As
 China's blue-chip index approaches an all-time high,
 growing fears about bubbles developing in some
 parts of the country's stock market are prodding
 some investors to seek bargains in Hong Kong.
- The US Nasdaq rallied to close at a record high Thursday, as investors bought tech stocks ahead of coming earning reports.

- The European Central Bank will check lending rates, corporate credit conditions and government bond yields to determine how much it will spend on its emergency bond-buying program.
- Bitcoin wavered on Friday and was heading toward its sharpest weekly drop since September.
- **Sterling** retreated from a near three-year high after figures signaled the UK economy is doing worse than analysts had feared.
- Global index publisher **FTSE Russell** will delete CNOOC Ltd from its global and China indexes due to the U.S. investment ban.



Business

Google has threatened to close its search engine in Australia if the government proceeds with a plan to force Big Tech groups to pay news providers for their content.


- IBM revealed a revenue decline last year of 6.5 percent but expects to return to growth this year.
- Intel posted a record annual revenue with sales of \$77.9bn for 2020.
- Dutch airline KLM may cut another 1,000 jobs this year as travel outlooks remain grim.
- Facebook is referring its decision to suspend
 Trump's account to a newly formed "Supreme Court" independent oversight board for review.
- Parler lost its bid to require Amazon to restore web hosting services.

- An A.P.Moller-Maersk cargo ship lost several hundred containers while sailing from China to Los Angeles, the latest in a series of weather-related accidents at sea impacting international shipping.
- The release of No Time to Die, the latest James Bond film, has been delayed until October as the pandemic means many cinemas remain closed. In the US, last year's domestic box-office revenues were just \$2.28 billion, down from \$11.4 billion in 2019.



Africa

- African Union member states voted to use digital COVID-19 certificates for travelers to reduce travel restrictions.
- The head of Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (Africa CDC) warned that mortality rates in more than 20 **African countries** are higher than the global average, likely due to the spread of the South African variant of the virus.
- **Sierra Leone** re-imposed a lockdown and overnight curfew in the capital of Freetown, citing "exponential" growth of COVID-19 cases.
- The **Central African Republic** declared a 13-day state of emergency after rebel groups disputed the outcome of the recent presidential election and vowed to overthrow the victor, President Touadera.







Asia

- Micronesia reported its first confirmed coronavirus infection.
- Indonesian authorities halted the search for victims of the recent Sriwijaya Air Jet crash.
- Taiwan's de facto ambassador to the US attended President Joe Biden's inauguration, calming fears in Taiwan that US support would erode in the post-Trump era.
- Prime Minister Narendra Modi said **India** was completely self-reliant on coronavirus vaccine supplies as the world's second-most populous country inoculated more than one million people within a week of starting a massive campaign. Five people were killed in a fire at an unfinished plant of India's Serum Institute; the chief of the institute said that it would not disrupt production of the vaccine the Institute is currently a key producer for Oxford-AstraZeneca.
- The Japanese government has insisted the Tokyo Olympics will go ahead this summer despite reports that the already
 postponed games will be cancelled amid growing concern about the level of Covid-19 infections. Japan's UN mission said, in
 a diplomatic note, that China's territorial claims in the South China Sea fail to abide by the UN Convention on the Law of the
 Sea.



Europe

- **Eurozone** consumer confidence dipped in January amid new coronavirus restrictions. The **UK and French** governments are in talks about offering aid to train operator Eurostar. British retailers struggled to recover in December from a partial coronavirus lockdown the previous month, marking a weak end to their worst year on record.
- Russia is cracking down on supporters of jailed opposition activist Navalny, warning of more arrests as calls for protests circulate. The Kremlin said that nationwide protests planned for Saturday to call for the release of jailed Kremlin critic Alexei Navalny were illegal and were being promoted by people it called provocateurs. The EU called on Russia to immediately release Navalny. US President Biden will seek to extent the New START treaty with Russia for 5 years.
- **German** Chancellor Merkel warned that she will not agree with **US** President Biden on everything but expressed overall optimism for a reset in cross-Atlantic ties. **EU** parliament MEPs overwhelmingly voted in favor of a resolution saying the bloc has lost credibility on human rights by making an investment deal with **China**.
- Northern Ireland extended its lockdown to March 5 as hospitals struggle. UK advisers warned against ending lockdowns too quickly. Hospitalizations and case rates are stabilizing in England. The UK canceled its Glastonbury Festival for the second year. Portuguese schools will close for at least 15 days.
 Spain's central government is resisting calls to give the country's regions greater power over coronavirus restrictions. The EU is resisting internal border closures to stop the spread of the UK strain, citing harm to the common market. France is requiring European visitors as well as those from outside the bloc to have a negative Covid-19 test performed less than three days before they enter the country. Romania surpassed 700,000 infections.



Middle East

Though Israel has vaccinated over 2m people (just over 600,000 have received both doses), COVID-19 infections are surging among the unvaccinated population.

 Sudanese news sources reported that the UAE is attempting the mediate the GERD issue between Ethiopia, Egypt and Sudan.

Saudi Arabia will reopen its embassy with Qatar "in days." The Saudi-led coalition fighting against Yemen's Houthi movement thwarted two attacks on Friday morning, including destroying an explosive-laden boat in the southern Red Sea, and intercepting an explosive-laden drone launched toward Saudi Arabia.

- The UN mission to **Libya** set the dates for voting on the leadership of a new transitional government between February 1-5.
- **Lebanon** extended its 24-hour lockdown for two weeks, shutting down the country for nearly four total weeks as COVID-19 deaths hit record highs three days in a row.



Americas

The mayor of Rio de Janeiro announced that Carnival would not take place, after the
festival was earlier postponed to the summer. Brazil gave iron miner Vale SA a tenday deadline to produce a better reparations package to the victims of deadly dam
disaster in 2019 which killed 270.

 The European Parliament called on the EU to recognize Juan Guaido as Venezuela's leader.

- Mexico again posted a record high for coronavirus deaths, 1,803 according to the Minister of Health. With 146,174 fatalities recorded since the pandemic began, this is equivalent to more than one death a minute.
- Coronavirus deaths in Colombia have surpassed 50,000. Intensive care unit
 occupancy rates exceed 90 percent in its three biggest cities, the capital Bogota,
 Medellin, and Cali. Columbia does not expect to receive first supplies of vaccine until
 early February.




Americas: US


- President Biden released his national COVID-19 strategy and signed a string of COVID-19 related executive orders, including a mask mandate for travel, increasing vaccinations, and addressing inequities in healthcare. Biden warned that COVID-19 deaths could top 500,000 next month. The US saw its second-highest daily death toll of 4,375. The number of people hospitalized with coronavirus fell below 120,000 on Thursday for the first time in more than three weeks. As of yesterday, 15.1 million Americans have been vaccinated. To meet an aggressive vaccination target of 100 million shots by the end of Biden's first 100 days in office, FEMA will create community vaccination centers, with the goal of 100 centers in the next month. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) will also launch a federal pharmacy program making vaccines available in local pharmacies.
- President Biden has directed the Occupational Safety and Health Administration to issue clear guidance for employers to help keep workers safe from COVID-19 exposure. Meatpacker JBS USA and chicken company Pilgrim's Pride Corp announced they will pay \$100 to US employees who voluntarily receive a COVID-19 vaccine.
- **Texas** surpassed 2.2 million infections and **Florida**, 1.6 million. Florida has begun to take aim at "*vaccine tourism*" with state and local officials saying vaccines would only be administered to residents.
- Speaker Pelosi said the House will be "completely ready" to pass Biden's \$1.9 trillion relief bill by February 1. A power-sharing deal in the 50-50 Senate is in limbo as Democratic leader Schumer and Republican leader McConnell are at a standoff over the filibuster. McConnell is proposing giving former President Trump two weeks to prepare for an impeachment trial. Congress backed a waiver for General Austin to become Biden's Defense Secretary.
- Republican lawmakers pressured the Biden Administration to respond more strongly to China's sanctions on top Trump Administration officials



Americas: U.S.

California, the national hotspot, is beginning to see positive effects from its strict lockdown, with daily new COVID-19 infections and hospitalizations on firm downward trendlines. The death toll continues to be high, averaging 484 a day over the past week, but is down from an average of 529 a day the week before.

State of the Transition: Biden Inaugurated and Immediate Geostrategic Threats

Following a non-peaceful transitional period that included a violent insurrection at the capital, a second impeachment in the House of Representatives, and the removal of President Trump from social media platforms, Joseph R. Biden Jr. was officially sworn in as President of the United States at noon on January 20.

On his first day, President Biden signed 17 separate executive orders which immediately reversed several Trump-era policies, including rejoining the Paris Climate Accords, reversing a travel ban on several Muslim-majority countries, and re-instating protections that prevent federal discrimination on the basis of gender identity. One of the Biden Administration's main focuses now is getting Cabinet nominees confirmed - on Inauguration Day, the Senate confirmed Avril Haines as the Director of National Intelligence by an 84-10 vote. The timelines for

other key national security and cabinet posts remain unclear, including when Secretary of State and Defense nominees (Antony Blinken and General Lloyd Austin respectively) will receive a full confirmation vote in the Senate - as of the writing of this report, sources in the Senate indicate that Austin may receive a vote on Friday morning, while Blinken could be confirmed on Monday or Tuesday next week. Senator Josh Hawley (MO) has announced his intention to hold up Biden's nominee to lead the Department of Homeland Security, Alejandro Mayorkas. The Senate schedule for hearings and nomination votes over the next several weeks is set to be further complicated by the second impeachment trial of former President Donald Trump.

In the immediate term, the Biden Administration faces several pressing foreign policy and international security challenges. US-Russian relations, already at an all-time low, are set to be further tested by the looming expiration of the New START Treaty in early February. The arms control agreement, which limits the number of tactical and strategic nuclear weapons and systems deployed around the world, is the last existing treaty between Washington and Moscow. On Thursday, sources in the Biden Administration indicated that the US is

willing to agree to a clean five-year extension of New START, a timeframe to which the Kremlin had previously been open. If this is indeed the case, the US will have averted the potential for a nuclear arms buildup and notched a clean diplomatic victory within the first few weeks of a new Administration. Cooperation between Moscow and Washington may end there for the time being, as the White House is expected to apply pressure on human rights issues (including the detention of Alexey Navalny), energy matters (Nordstream II) and great power competition questions in the Middle East and Southeast Asia. Europe is also poised to return as an area for security competition, as the Biden Administration reevaluates decisions made by President Trump to cut US troop levels in Germany and Poland.

In the Middle East, Iran is looking to test the Biden Administration on several fronts. A month before President Biden's inauguration, the Iranian parliament passed a law requiring uranium to be enriched at 20 percent, far exceeding the limits set in the JCPOA, or Iran Nuclear Deal. While still below the levels required for weaponization, the decision to enrich has shortened Tehran's "breakout" time to a nuclear bomb and introduced an additional element of uncertainty in the region. Another simmering flashpoint is Iran's return to seizing tankers in the Strait of Hormuz, as evidenced by the capture of a South

Korean vessel in early January. Although far behind the capabilities of its regional rivals, Iran has engaged in a slow buildup of naval forces in the Gulf and will likely have the ability to further disrupt energy and commercial shipping if they so choose. The Biden Administration will likely seek to tamp down tensions through slow, strategic diplomatic outreach, although the sequencing of such actions remains unclear. Washington and Iran have both claimed that the other must come into compliance before rejoining the JCPOA, setting up a tense beginning to 2021. Furthermore, the window for action is closing as Iranian presidential elections are set for June. Barring any significant geopolitical developments before the summer, a hardline candidate is expected to ascend to the Iranian presidency and further complicate any hopes of a diplomatic resolution.

Finally, two simmering crises in the Western Hemisphere will demand President Biden's attention in the first several months of 2021. The Trump Administration's decision to re-label Cuba as a state sponsor of terror will complicate any planned diplomatic outreach from the new White House, while Venezuela remains an intractable problem for policymakers in the US and Europe. Despite losing international recognition as the legitimate leader of Venezuela, Nicolas Maduro has





consolidated his power in the country with the aid of Iran and Russia. The decision of Juan Guaido and his opposition movements in Venezuela to boycott December's parliamentary elections appears to have backfired and allowed Maduro to further entrench his regime. The expanding presence of Moscow and Tehran in South America will worry the Biden Administration as it seeks to stabilize ongoing geopolitical threats. As a general strategy, look for the President Biden and his national security team to first "do no harm" on matters of foreign policy while engaging with historical allies and partners on a multilateral basis. This may not be enough however, as the ongoing public health crises at home distract from the growing flashpoints abroad.




