What to Expect When You're Being Audited by the IRS

An audit is an investigation into the taxes of a person or business; its purpose is to determine if the information given to the government is correct.

There are three types of IRS audits:

- •The correspondence audit, which is an IRS letter that requests copies of your canceled checks and/or receipts so they can verify certain deductions on your return.
- •The office audit, at which time you're asked to bring specific information to the IRS office for review.
- •Field audit; this audit is conducted at your workplace.

While anyone can be audited, the IRS particularly focuses on corporations, abusive tax shelters, and taxpayers earning \$100,000 and more.

Regardless of the reason you're being audited and the type of audit you're facing, you'll need a <u>NJ Tax</u> <u>Lawyer</u> to help you.

When the IRS conducts an audit, they review four issues:

- •Income: Your bank statements, state and federal tax refunds are carefully reviewed. Records from the sale of assets, documents for alimony, pension, and prizes are also reviewed.
- •Past audits: If you've been audited before, IRS agents will review all information pertaining to it.
- •Penalties: The IRS will learn if your past audit resulted in penalization.
- •Other returns: There will be a review of whether you filed on time in previous years and if adjustments were needed.

IRS agents review your documentations to see if your business is based on personal interest. For example, if a person has a floral business that is hobby instead of a business, this is a violation.

Violations come with excruciating consequences. You could face a penalty of 20-75% and accumulating interest. In most serious cases, you could face prison time.

When you're facing stiff penalties, this is the time to contact a New Jersey tax attorney.
