JUDGMENTS

Key Decisions

21 April 2017 - *ILS Rehab Pty Ltd v Josephine Borg (as administrator of the estate of the late Damien Robert Borg*) [2017] NSWSC 442 - CONTRACTS – general contractual principles – construction and interpretation of shareholders agreement – no dispute that clause did not accurately reflect parties' intentions –appropriate to make order for rectification – whether clause was void for uncertainty – clause not void for uncertainty as it was capable of being given meaning by the court – not necessary to imply a term – defendant's construction of clause would not produce a commercial result and was not consistent with text and context.

This case relates to the construction of an agreement between shareholders. The plaintiff is a company, which supplies mobility products used by people with medical conditions. It had three directors who were the only shareholders, and each held one share. The defendant is the administrator of the estate of one of the directors who passed away. Following the death of the director a question arose as to how to construct the Shareholders' Agreement regarding the purchase of the share of a deceased director.

The Shareholders' Agreement provided that purchase price is equal to three times the company earnings before tax or depreciation in the immediately preceding financial year, and did not state when the share had to be sold. The defendant sought to sell the share at any point in time and for the value of three times the company's earnings. The plaintiff brought proceeding seeking immediate sale.

The Court found in favour of the plaintiff. It concluded that the purchase price equals the percentage shareholding of the outgoing Shareholder multiplied by three times the company earnings, and the sale of the share was to be done so immediately. It disagreed with the defendant's strict reading of the clauses and placed emphasis on interpreting the agreement in the manner intended by the parties at the time of entering the contract. The Court had little regard to the financial hardship that would be incurred by the defendant as a result of the sale because the alternative interpretation was commercially unworkable.

The applicant in this case was employed by the respondent, Ambulance Service of New South Wales, as a claims manager. The applicant took a period of absence on sick leave, which he attributed to an exacerbation of anxiety disorder he experienced after a meeting with his manager. Upon his return to work his employment was terminated by the respondent.

The applicant brought an unfair dismissal claim against the respondent. The respondent argued that the decision to terminate the applicant's employment was made after learning that he had undertaken full-time work with another employer during his sick leave, which was contrary to his employment contract and constituted abandonment of his employment.

The Court dismissed the claim. It held that the applicant's formal acceptance of full-time permanent employment indicated an intention to cease his employment relationship with the respondent. Further, he was in breach of his employment contract which required explicit approval from the respondent before engaging in secondary employment, and he repeatedly refused to apply for secondary employment approval. In response to the applicant's claim that he was undertaking external duties for the purpose of retaining his confidence and an injury management plan, the court held that an employment contract remains binding even when employees are on sick leave.

GPs may wish to note that the 2017 update of the Immunisation Handbook will include minor changes to the rabies chapter to reflect a risk assessment approach to rabies post-exposure prophylaxis after handling dead animals.

27 April 2017 - Fees for playing music in practices to increase - For the information of practices that play licenced music in their waiting rooms or during telephone calls, the Phonographic Performance Company of Australia has advised the AMA that there will be a CPI-based increase of around 1.5 per cent to tariff rates that will apply from 1 July 2017 to all new licences and/or renewals.
