# Global

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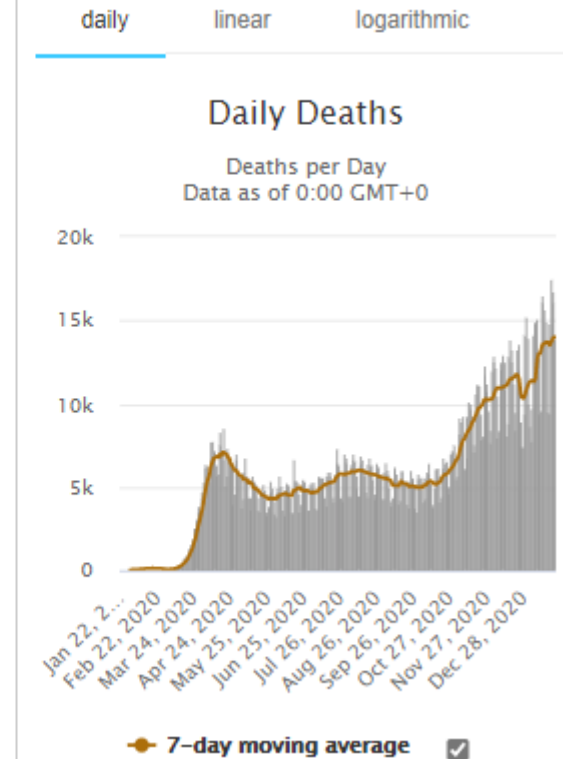
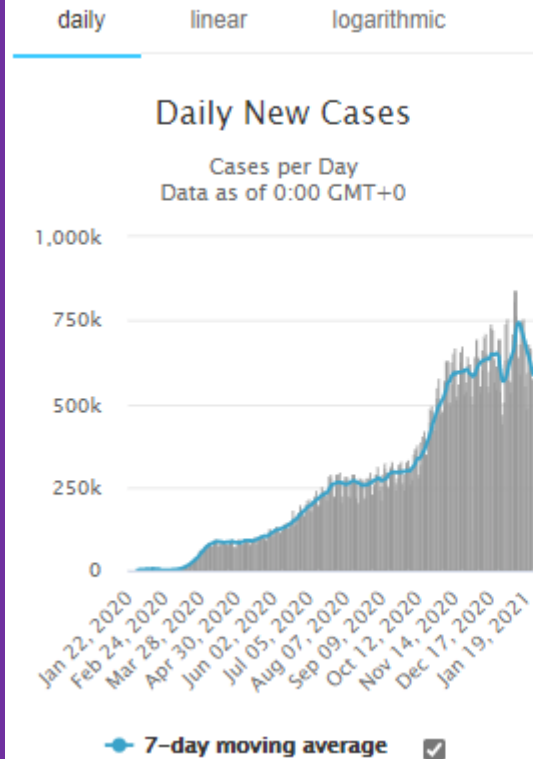
**Earth's ice is melting faster today than in the mid-1990s, new research suggests, as climate change nudges global temperatures ever higher. An estimated 28 trillion metric tons of ice have melted away from the world's sea ice, ice sheets and glaciers.**

- British Prime Minister Johnson suggested for the first time that the **UK COVID-19 variant** may be more deadly than the original virus. Because it can spread more easily, it can also quickly overwhelm medical systems, turning previously survivable bouts with the virus into perilous ones if hospitals are full and medical care is limited. The toll has risen by an average of over 1,000 per day for the past 7 days.
- The UN celebrated a milestone on Friday as the **Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW)** came into force. It is the first multilateral nuclear disarmament treaty in more than 50 years. So far, however, none of the nine countries that are known or believed to have nuclear weapons — the US, UK, Russia, China, France, India, Pakistan, Israel and North Korea — have signed up to the new accord.

# Global

**Confirmed coronavirus cases globally surpassed 99 million, with deaths at 2.13 million. The rate of new infections continued to ease, and the death rate is leveling off.**

**The number of daily new cases in the US and UK dropped, while remaining high. The US averaged 171,000 daily new cases, compared to 209,000 the previous week. UK averaged 36,000 daily new cases compared to 45,100. Conditions slightly improved in Brazil, which averaged 50,900 daily new cases compared to 54,300.**

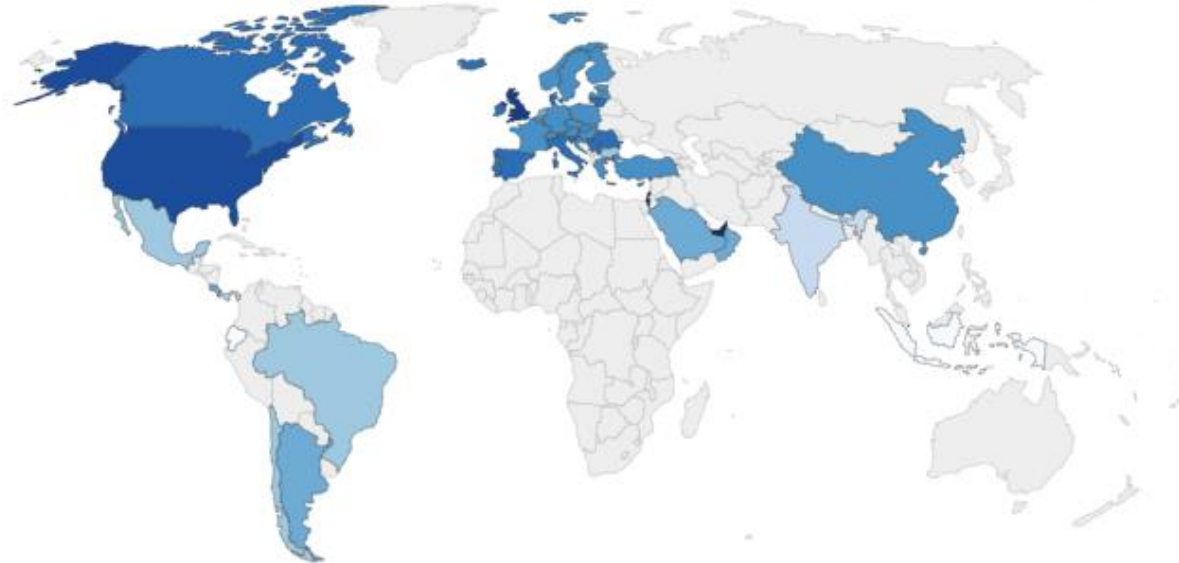

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# COVID-19 Vaccine

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**AstraZeneca Plc has informed European Union officials on Friday it would cut deliveries of its COVID-19 vaccine to the bloc by 60 percent to 31 million doses in the first quarter of the year due to production problems at a vaccine factory in Belgium run by its partner Novasep.**

- According to updated guidance from the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, people who have received their first dose of a coronavirus vaccine can schedule their second shot up to six weeks later if they are not able to get one in the recommended time frame. The **recommended interval between doses** is three weeks for the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine and four weeks for Moderna's.
- **Merck** is ending its Covid-19 vaccine development after its two candidates failed to elicit as strong immune responses as the vaccines already available.
- The Russian Sovereign Wealth Fund (RDIF) has also signed deals to produce **Sputnik V** with manufacturers in Turkey, South Korea, China, India, Brazil, Belarus and Kazakhstan.

# Markets

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**Global shares rose to levels just shy of record highs on Monday, as optimism over a \$1.9 trillion US stimulus plan outweighed rising COVID-19 cases and delays in vaccine supplies.**

- Foreign investors who for years saw Turkey as a lost cause of economic mismanagement are returning, drawn by the promise of some of the biggest returns in **emerging markets** if President Tayyip Erdogan stays true to a pledge of reforms.
- Australia's securities regulator said there was a **cyber security breach** at a server it used to transfer files including credit license applications.
- **Oil prices** edged up on Monday as supply jitters and US stimulus plans offset fresh concerns about the hit to global fuel demand from renewed lockdowns to curb spikes in COVID-19 infections.

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# Business

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## Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Co Ltd will prioritize production of auto chips if it is able to further increase capacity, amid a global shortage that has hampered car production

- In a landmark verdict in one of the mining world's most high-profile legal cases, a Swiss criminal court found **Israeli businessman Beny Steinmetz** guilty of corruption and forgery to obtain exploration permits for iron ore buried in Guinea.
- Life insurers, including **Prudential Financial Inc**, and **Aviva PLC**, are now imposing waiting periods before COVID-19 patients, including those who have recovered, can apply for coverage, executives and spokespeople said. Some are also limiting coverage for certain age groups.
- **Royal Dutch Shell** is acquiring the owner of the UK's largest public electric vehicle charging network, **ubitricity**, for an undisclosed amount.
- Chinese aircraft manufacturer **Comac** has been testing a new passenger jet. If successful, the C919 could rival **Boeing and Airbus** in the largest aviation market in the world.



# Africa

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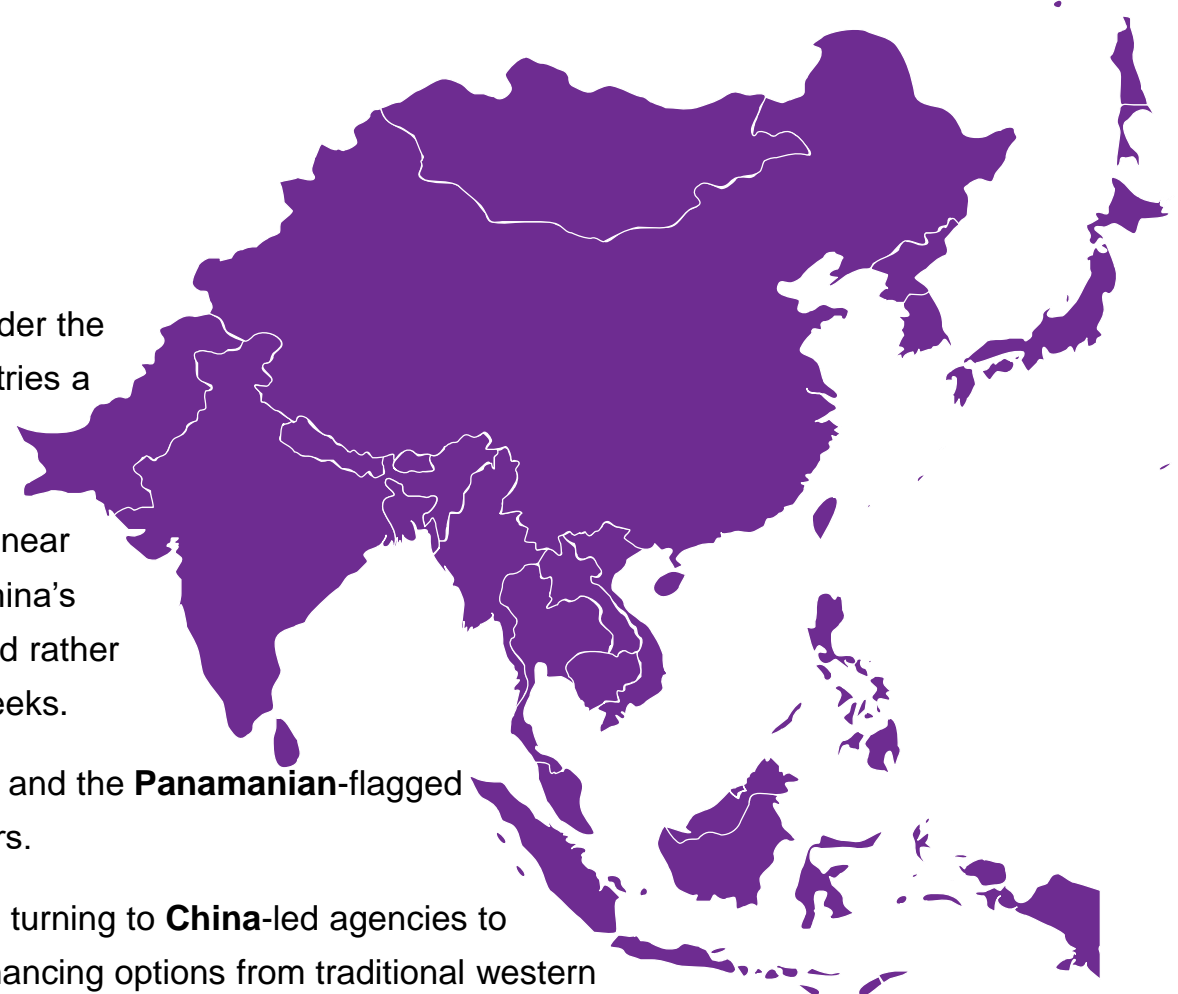
- The UN appealed this week for an end to sexual assaults in the **Ethiopia's** Tigray region, where girls and women in refugee camps are reporting rapes by uniformed Ethiopian Army members.
- **Ugandan** soldiers, working as part of the African Union peacekeeping force in **Somalia**, killed 189 al Qaeda-linked al Shabaab fighters in an attack on one of their camps.
- **South Africa** surpassed 40,000 deaths, with 1.4 million infections, the highest on the continent. **Burkina Faso** registered 10,000 infections.
- A third minister in the southern African kingdom of **Eswatini** has died of coronavirus.



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# Asia

- **China** has purchased less than three-fifths of the **US** goods projected under the “*phase one*” trade deal that paused a tariff dispute between the two countries a year ago. China was the largest recipient of foreign direct investment in 2020, with \$163 billion in inflows. Chinese air force planes **Taiwan’s** air defense identification zone for a second day on Sunday, as tensions rise near the island just days into US President Joe Biden’s new administration. China’s activities mark a ratcheting up with fighters and bombers being dispatched rather than reconnaissance aircraft as had generally been the case in recent weeks.
- **Indonesia** said its coast guard had seized the **Iranian**-flagged MT Horse and the **Panamanian**-flagged MT Freya vessels over suspected illegal oil transfer in the country’s waters.
- Pacific island nations, including the **Cook Islands, Vanuatu and Fiji**, are turning to **China**-led agencies to plug funding gaps in their pandemic-ravaged budgets after exhausting financing options from traditional western partners, stoking fears the region is becoming more dependent on Beijing.
- **Australia** approved the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine for use but warned AstraZeneca’s international production problems mean the country would need to distribute a locally manufactured shot earlier than planned. Pfizer Inc has filed an application seeking approval of its coronavirus vaccines to be used in **South Korea** as the country gears up to begin inoculations next month. Australia has suspended quarantine-free travel with **New Zealand**.

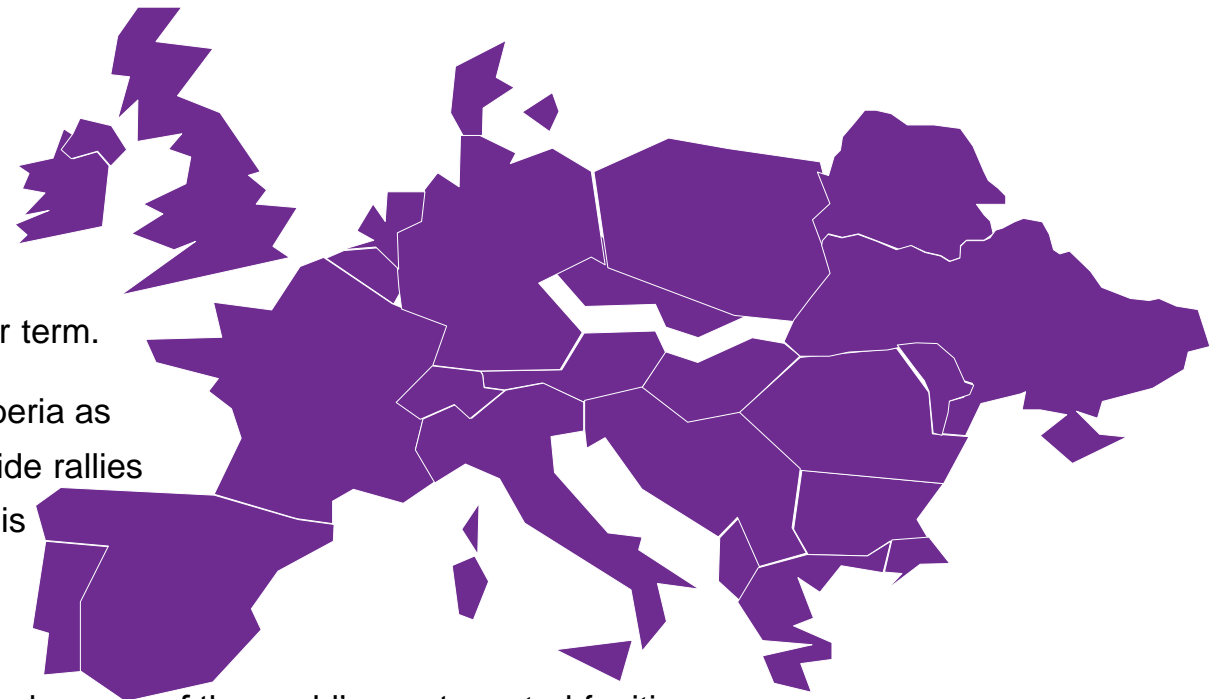


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# Europe

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- **Portugal's** center-right president was re-elected to a second five-year term.
- Police detained more than 3,000 people in **Russia's** Far East and Siberia as protesters defying bitter cold and a ban by authorities staged nationwide rallies to demand the release of jailed Kremlin critic Alexei Navalny. The **EU** is considering fresh sanctions on Russian.
- **Dutch** police have arrested Tse Chi Lop, a Chinese-born Canadian national, the alleged leader of a large Asian drug syndicate who is listed as one of the world's most-wanted fugitives.
- The **UK** is considering making it mandatory for travelers to spend a 10-day quarantine period in a hotel for which they would have to pay, as a way to enforce the quarantine rules. Responding to the spread of the UK variant, **Norway** ordered all shops except for food stores, pharmacies and petrol stations closed in Oslo and several nearby municipalities and gave authorization to local authorities to shut down schools. Cases involving the variant are increasing 70 percent a week in **Denmark**, despite a strict lockdown. **Sweden** is closing its border with **Norway**. New border controls went into force in **France** on Sunday, requiring travelers from **EU** countries by air or sea to produce a negative PCR test result. **Germany** tightened entry restrictions on Sunday for visitors from almost 30 countries. **Belgium** will ban non-essential trips in and out of the country. **Portugal** surpassed 600,000 infections and 10,000 deaths. **Ukraine** reopens schools, restaurants and gyms, ending a tough lockdown introduced on January 8 after significant improvement in new infection rates. **Dutch** protesters gathered in defiance of lockdown orders in at least 10 towns and cities Sunday, looting stores and clashing with police after authorities imposed a new nighttime curfew.

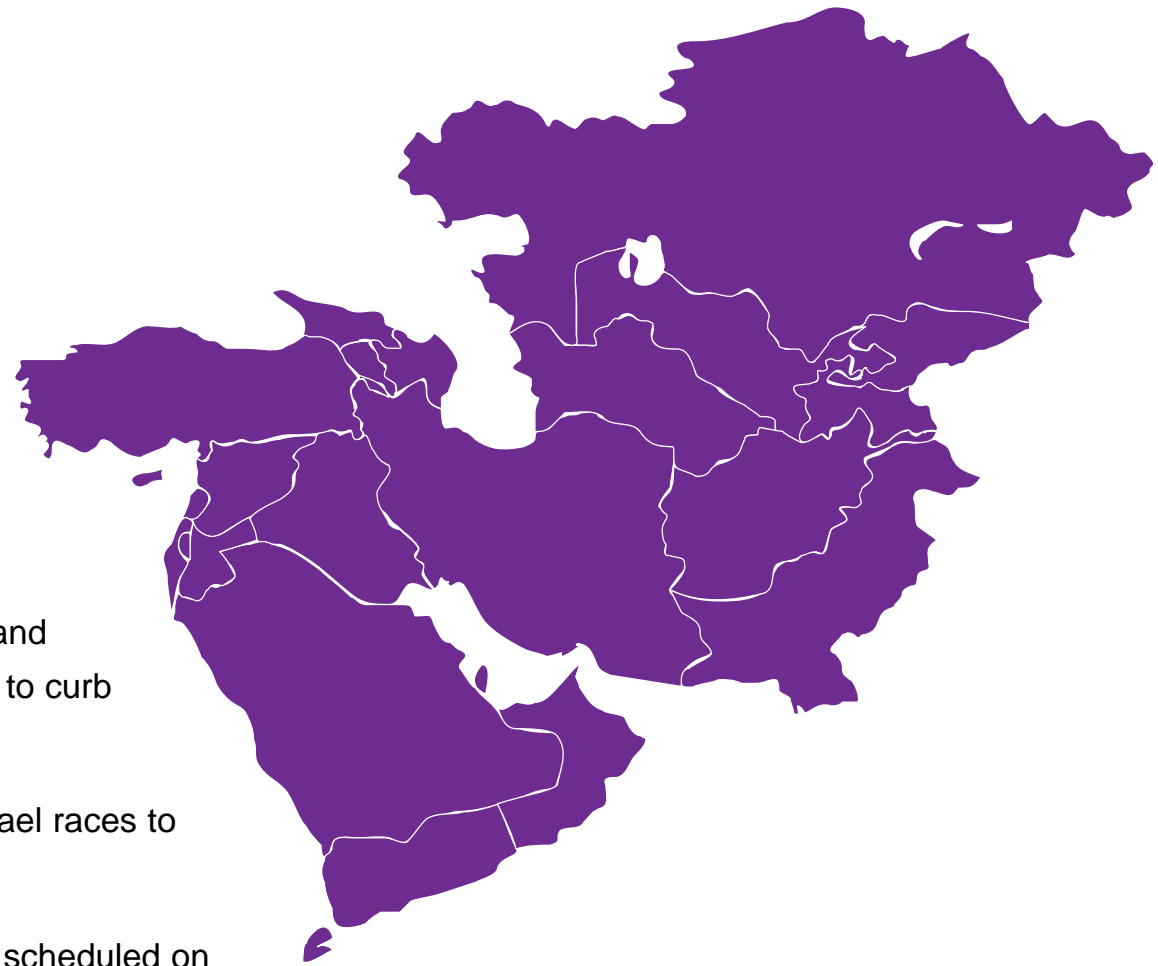


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# Middle East

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- **Saudi** forces have busted a drug smuggling ring, seizing a massive haul of more than 20 million amphetamine tablets inside a grapefruit shipment at the Jeddah Islamic Port. Saudi Arabia's sovereign wealth fund is seeking to use its financial muscle to lure international health and technology companies to set up operations in the kingdom.
- In the **UAE**, Dubai has further tightened rules for social gatherings, cafes and restaurants, as well as gyms and other fitness centers as part of its efforts to curb a spike in new COVID-19 infections.
- Ben Gurion International Airport will be shuttered for at least a week as Israel races to vaccinate more of its population.
- **Turkey and Russia** ignored a deadline to pull their forces out of **Libya** as scheduled on Saturday under a UN-backed cease-fire deal, highlighting the fragility of peace efforts after a decade of conflict.
- Hundreds of demonstrators took to the streets of **Tunisian** cities over the weekend to protest police repression, corruption and poverty, following several nights of unrest marked by clashes and arrests.
- **Western Sahara's** pro-independence Polisario Front launched rockets into the Guerguerat buffer zone under **Moroccan** control in the far south of the desert territory in an overnight attack.

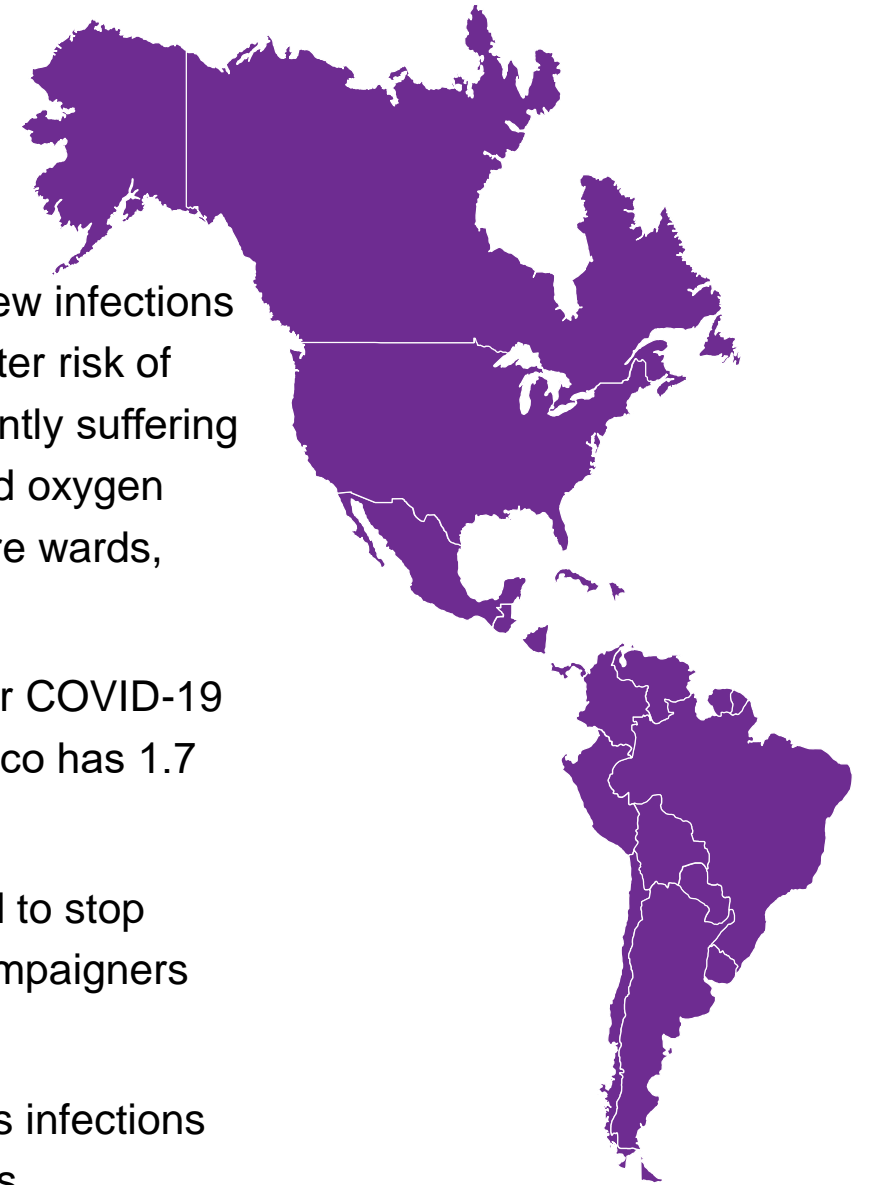


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# Americas

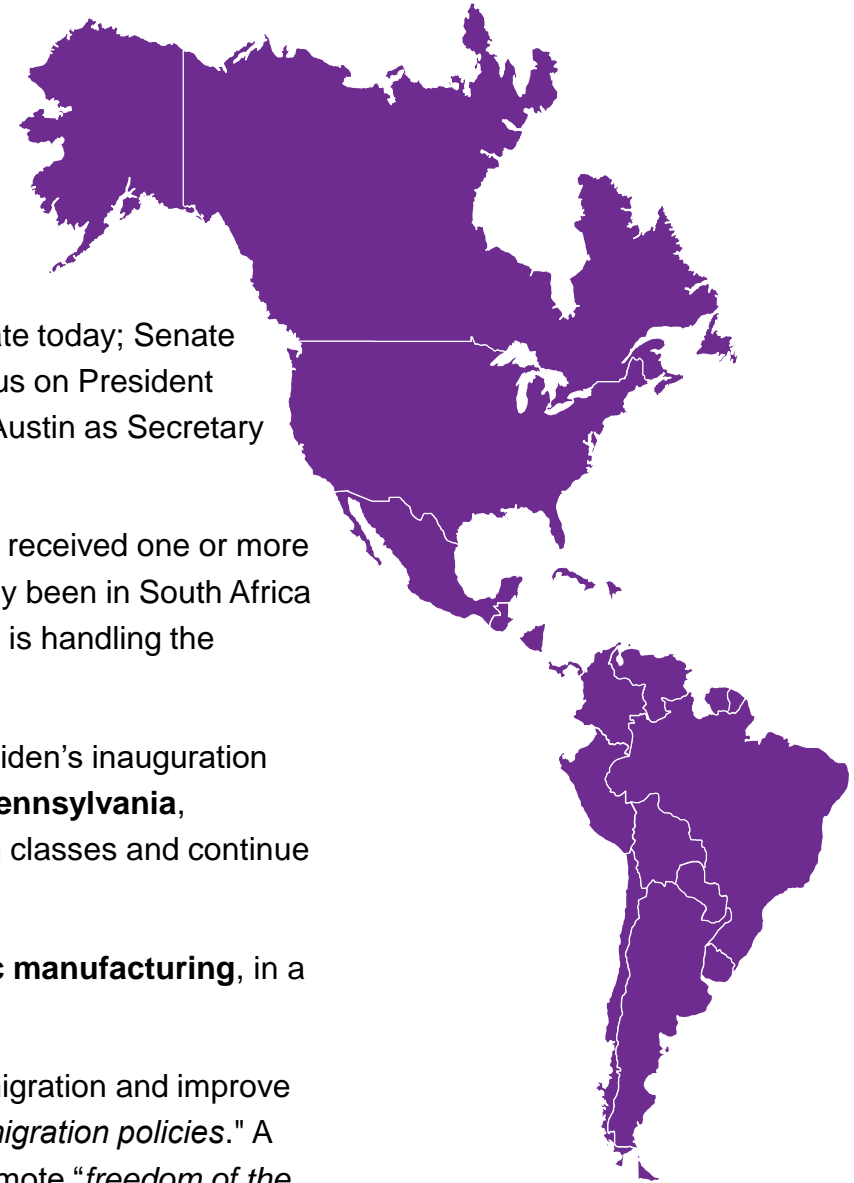
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- The new **Brazil** variant of COVID-19 already accounts for about half of new infections in the Brazilian Amazonian city of Manaus, raising concerns about a greater risk of spread, a researcher warned. Manaus, the Amazon's largest city, is currently suffering a surge of cases that has overwhelmed its hospital system and exhausted oxygen supplies, leaving dozens of people to die in their homes and intensive care wards, doctors report.
- **Mexico's** President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador had tested positive for COVID-19 amid the country's deadliest week yet in the coronavirus pandemic. Mexico has 1.7 million confirmed infections and is nearing 150,000 deaths.
- Credit Suisse, Dutch lender ING and France's BNP Paribas have decided to stop financing the trade in crude oil from **Ecuador**, following pressure from campaigners aiming to protect the Amazon rainforest.
- **Bolivia** and the **Dominican Republic** surpassed 200,000 confirmed virus infections over the weekend. **Colombia** surpassed 2 million with over 51,000 deaths.



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# Americas: US



- In Congress, the House will send the **Articles of Impeachment** of former President Trump to the Senate today; Senate leaders agreed to push back the impeachment trial by two weeks, giving the chamber more time to focus on President Biden's legislative agenda and Cabinet nominees. The Senate **confirmed** retired Army General Lloyd Austin as Secretary of Defense; the chamber will vote on nomination of Janet Yellen as Treasury Secretary on Monday.
- As national infections surpassed **25 million**, and more than **419,000 deaths**, **18.5 million** people have received one or more doses of vaccine. President Biden will **ban** most non-US citizens entering the country who have recently been in South Africa starting Saturday. More than two-thirds of Americans approve of how Joe Biden, the new US president, is handling the response to the coronavirus pandemic, an **Ipsos poll** showed on Sunday.
- Between 150 and 200 National Guard deployed to **Washington, DC** to provide security for President Biden's inauguration have tested positive for the coronavirus. **Arizona and Tennessee** surpassed 700,000 infections and **Pennsylvania**, 800,000. In **Illinois**, where infections top 1.1 million, Chicago Teachers Union voted to refuse in-person classes and continue remote instruction.
- US president Joe Biden is set to tighten "*buy American*" provisions as part of a push to boost **domestic manufacturing**, in a move that risks straining relations with key US allies.
- In a call with **Mexican** President Obrador, Biden outlined his plan to create new legal pathways for immigration and improve the process for people requesting asylum, while "*reversing the previous administration's draconian immigration policies.*" A US aircraft carrier group led by the USS Theodore Roosevelt has entered the **South China Sea** to promote "*freedom of the seas.*" US Secretary of Defense Austin reaffirmed America's commitment to defending **Japan's** claim on the disputed East China Sea islets known as the Senkaku.

# Vaccine Update: Immunization in Latin America

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By the end of 2020, Latin America and the Caribbean had confirmed over 15 million COVID-19 cases and 500,000 deaths, having spent much of the year as a global epicenter of the coronavirus pandemic. Now in 2021, as the region continues to face severe outbreaks, vaccines are urgently needed.

As Latin America's pathway to immunization becomes clearer, it is apparent that regional players will rely on a unique combination of western, Chinese, Russian, and Covax vaccines in order to meet the needs of their populations.

Brazil, Argentina, and Mexico lead the region in vaccine rollout, but smaller states have also begun administering shots and signing deals with leading vaccine producers. While many countries yet lack sufficient doses for their entire populations, much of the region appears on track to vaccinate key vulnerable populations in coming months.

## Brazil, Mexico, and Argentina

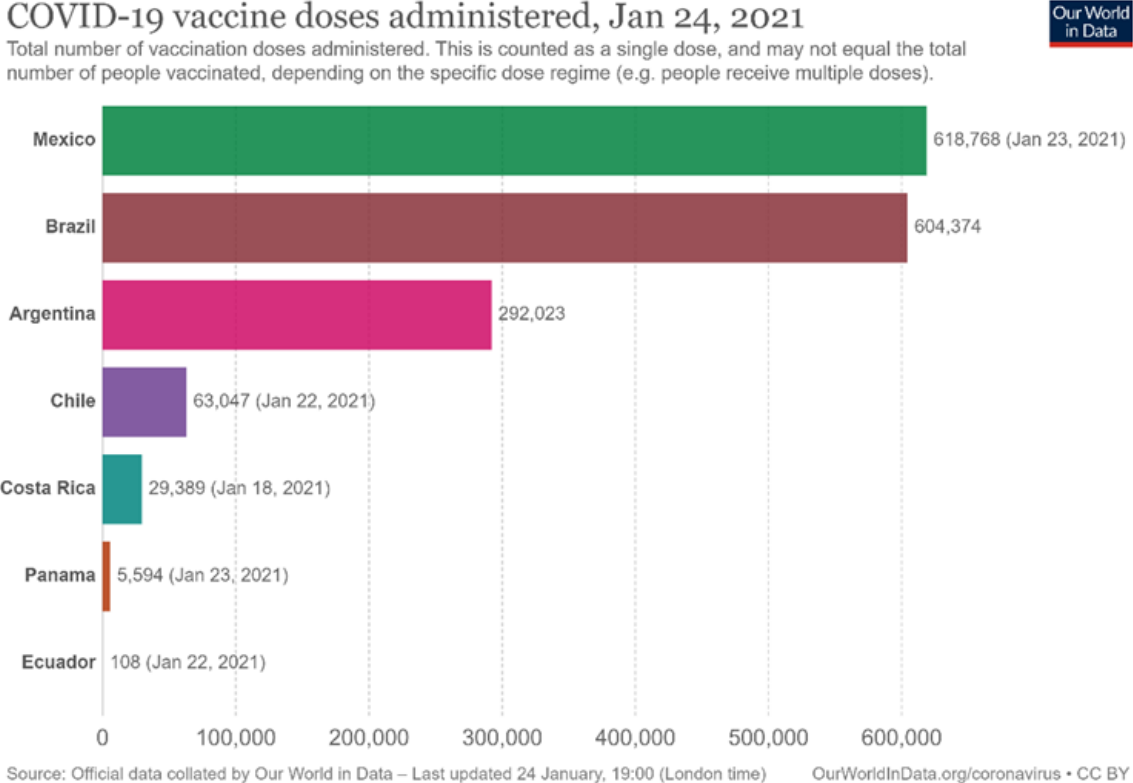
Brazil has been a global vaccine focal point for its role in testing China's Sinovac vaccine, CoronaVac. The vaccine has been a point of political tension in the country, as the state governor of Sao Paulo's deals for the vaccine were out of step with the federal government's

vaccine procurement. Moreover, the Sao Paulo institute running CoronaVac trials, the Butantan Institute, ultimately declared the vaccine's efficacy rate at 50.4 percent (although it is much more effective at preventing severe illness). Though the efficacy rate is lower than hoped for, CoronaVac remains integral to Brazil's vaccine strategy, and the 600,000 vaccines administered thus far have all been from Sinovac – according to the figures pulled by Our World in Data. Moreover, the Butantan Institute is set to manufacture and distribute CoronaVac, making it an important part of regional vaccine access.

Along with CoronaVac, Brazil's health regulator Anvisa has also approved the AstraZeneca-Oxford vaccine, and Brazil's foreign ministry has said it is in talks with the Serum Institute of India to purchase AstraZeneca vaccines manufactured there. However, Anvisa turned down a request to register Sputnik V, citing lack of authorization to conduct Phase III clinical trials and issues related to manufacturing practices. According to the Duke University Global Health Innovation Center's vaccine deal tracker, Brazil has an agreement for 50 million Sputnik V doses, along with 102 million AstraZeneca-Oxford doses, 100 million CoronaVac doses, and an unknown number of Pfizer-BioNTech doses (Brazil did in December 2020 sign a letter of intent to purchase 70 million doses from Pfizer in 2021).

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# Vaccine Update: Immunization in Latin America

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While Brazil has thus far relied on Sinovac's vaccine, Argentina has become the flagship country for Russia's Sputnik V in Latin America. The country has already received 600,000 doses of Sputnik V and expects more this month and in February. So far, over 290,000 doses have been administered – including to Argentina's President Fernandez, who expressed gratitude to Sputnik V's developers in a boost for Russian vaccine diplomacy in the region. In addition to the total 25 million doses of Sputnik V promised to Argentina, the country has a contract to buy 22 million doses of the AstraZeneca-Oxford vaccine, which is also approved in the country.

Thus far, Mexico has vaccinated the most people of any Latin American country – over 615,000, according to Our World in Data's tally. The country began its inoculation drive on December 24 after receiving a shipment of just 3,000 vaccine doses from Pfizer-BioNTech – but Mexico's foreign minister has since announced that 1.4 million more doses would arrive in January (though the country was affected by shipping delays), with a total of almost 12 million expected from Pfizer by June. While vaccines administered thus far have all been Pfizer-BioNTech, Mexico also approved the AstraZeneca-Oxford vaccine on January 4. Last week, Mexican officials announced that

the active substance needed for domestic production of the vaccine had arrived from Argentina, allowing for the country to produce 6 million doses of the AstraZeneca-Oxford vaccine for use as soon as late March. While these 18 million doses are far from sufficient to cover Mexico's population of over 127 million, Duke University's vaccine deal tracker indicates that the country has made a series of deals with additional producers for unspecified amount of vaccine.

## Other States

Beyond the region's three vaccine leaders, Chile, Panama, and Costa Rica have begun their vaccination drives, all using the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine. For other countries, deliveries are expected imminently.

- Ecuador expects a shipment of 50,000 Pfizer-BioNTech doses this month, with another 2 million delivered by March.
- Peru's government has purchased a combination of 52 million doses from China's Sinopharm and Oxford-AstraZeneca. One million of the Chinese vaccines are scheduled to arrive in January, while the Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccines will not be available until September.

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- Colombia expects a shipment of 1.7 million Pfizer-BioNTech doses this February.
- Bolivia has signed a deal with Sputnik V for 2.7 million doses, with 6,000 to arrive in January, another 1.7 million by the end of March, and the remainder by May. The country also signed a deal with India's Serum Institute for 5 million doses of the Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine, the first 1 million doses of which will arrive in April.
- Venezuela has approved the Sputnik V vaccine and announced a deal for 20 million doses but have yet to produce a timeline.

government deal making drives vaccine rollout around the world. A number of Latin American countries are eligible for vaccine financial aid through Covax's Advance Market Commitment (AMC), including Haiti, Bolivia, El Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua, Dominica, Grenada, St. Lucia, and St. Vincent and the Grenadines. Covax hopes to distribute enough doses for health and social care workers in the first half of 2021, and to deliver a total of 2 billion doses by the end of the year.

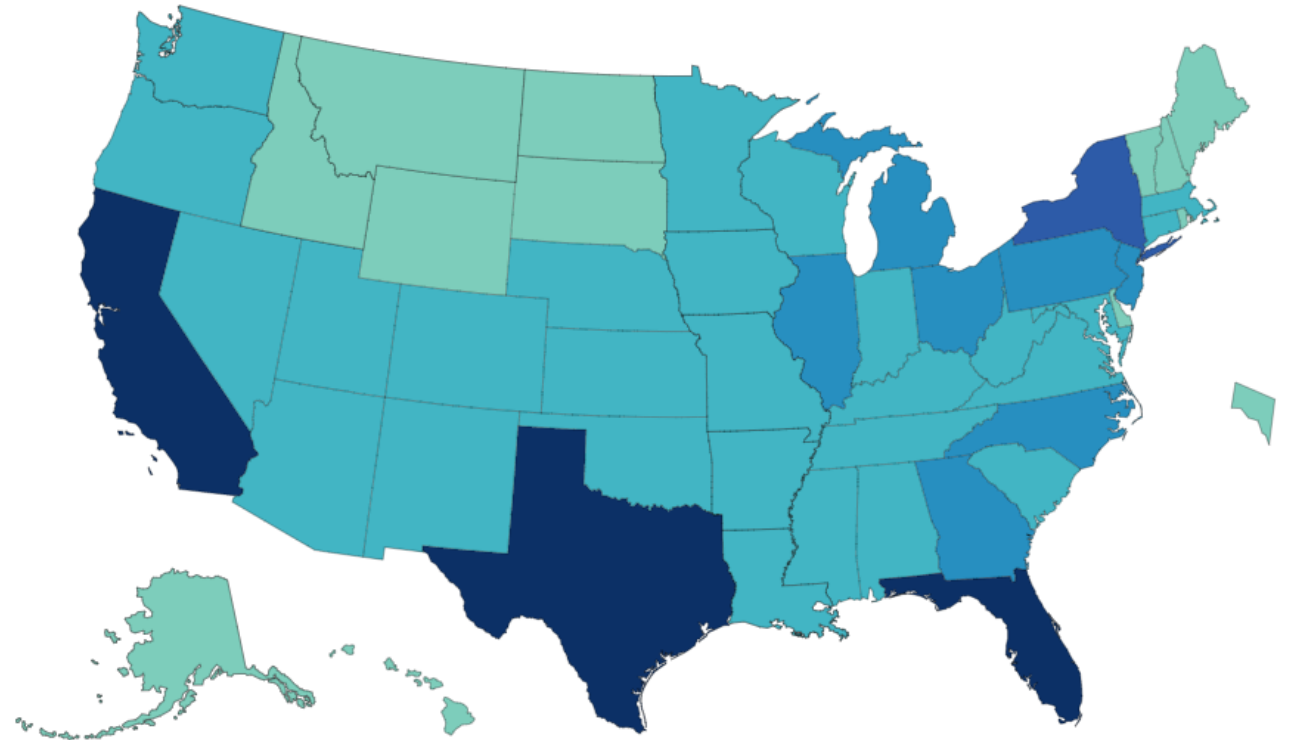
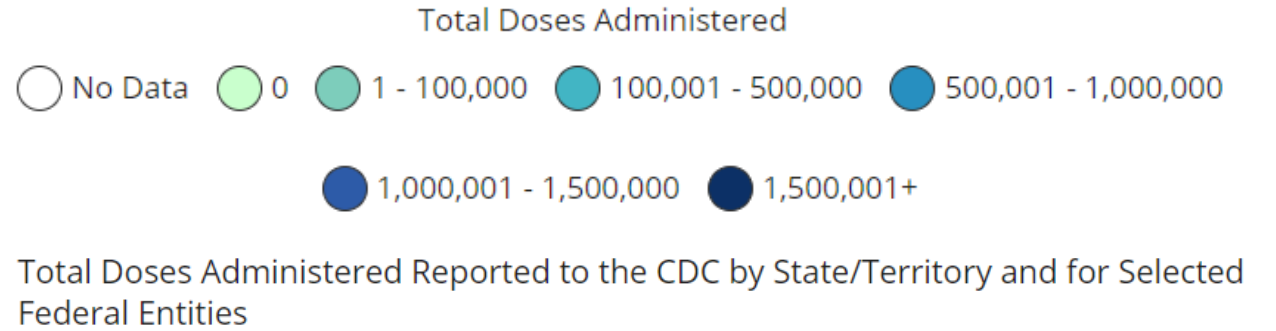
Ultimately, the Covax initiative will play a key role in vaccinations for Latin America, promising to cover the entire region. However, Covax rollout remains slow and uncertain. Only the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine has thus far been approved for emergency use by the WHO, a regulatory requirement for Covax – and it was only last Friday that the WHO reached an agreement with Pfizer for as many as 40 million doses. The WHO is reportedly also in the final stages of reviewing the Moderna, AstraZeneca-Oxford, Sinopharm and Sinovac vaccines for approval in coming weeks and months. Meanwhile, individual

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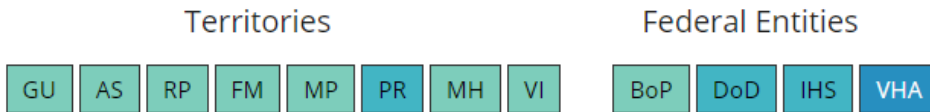
# Country in Charts: United States

Since December 14, 21.9 million vaccine doses have been administered across the nation, of which 3.2 million are second doses; 12.1 million are Pfizer-BioNTech while 9.8 are Moderna vaccines.

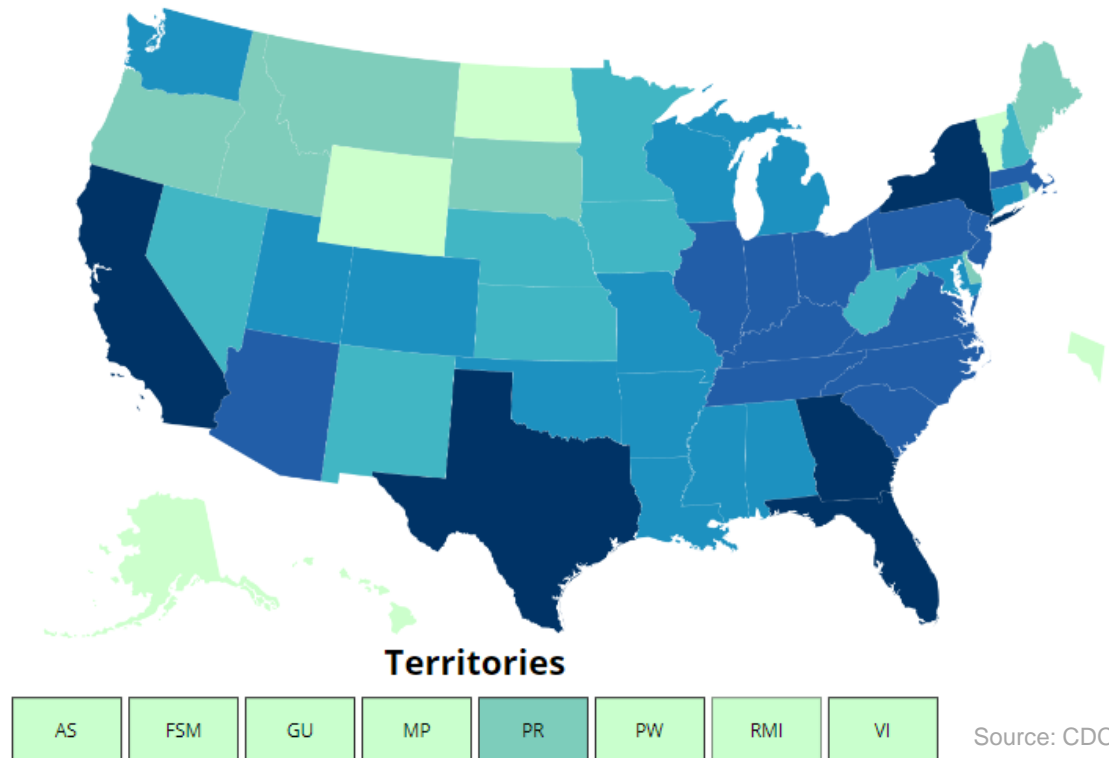
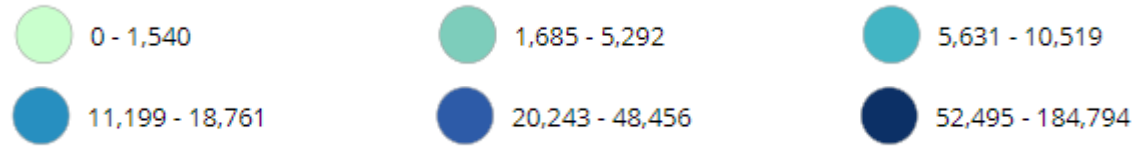
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# Country in Charts: United States

Last week, the rate of daily new cases continued to ease, but with California, Texas, New York and Florida still reporting more than 10,000 cases most days. There were 17 states with 7-day averages of new cases above 5 percent; two weeks before there were 40 states.

The UK strain of the virus has been discovered in at least 20 states, up 50 percent from last week. The surge in Southern California has been linked to a different variant (CAL.20C) which emerged in November.

## Cases in Last 7 Days



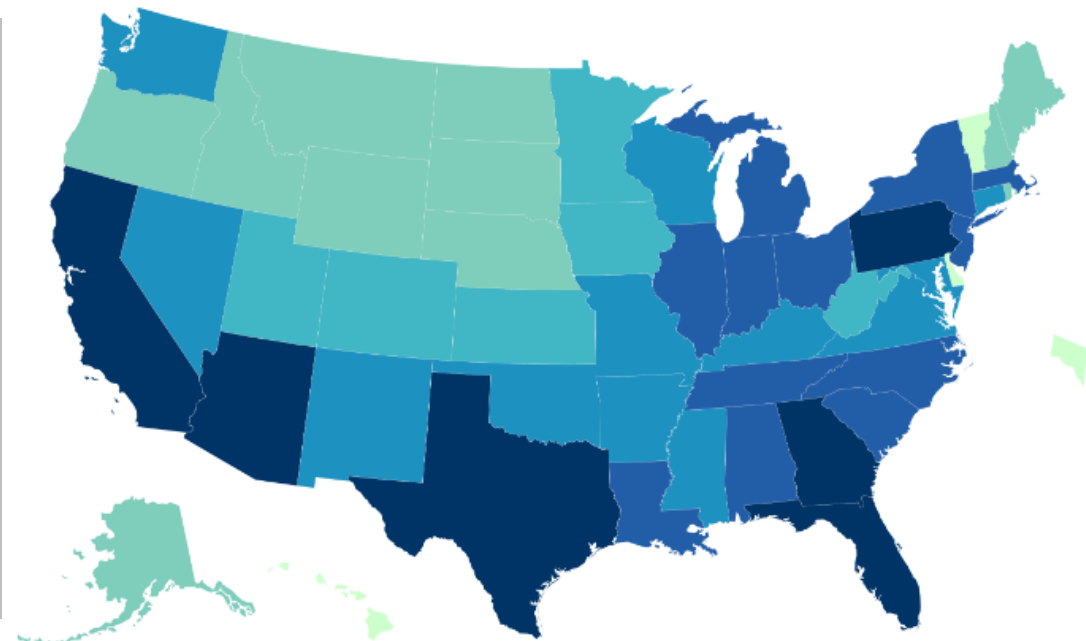
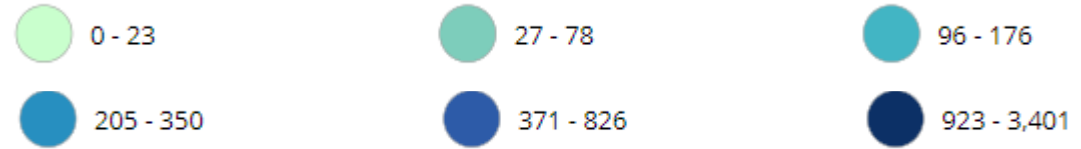
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# Country in Charts: United States

Daily deaths continued to trend down, while remaining high, averaging 3,019 over the week (slightly down from the previous week at 3,275). Experts assess that the country is past the holiday surge, but warn that hospitalizations remain very high.

There are now 110,628 people hospitalized, trending down nationally. Hospitalizations in the South and West are declining modestly.

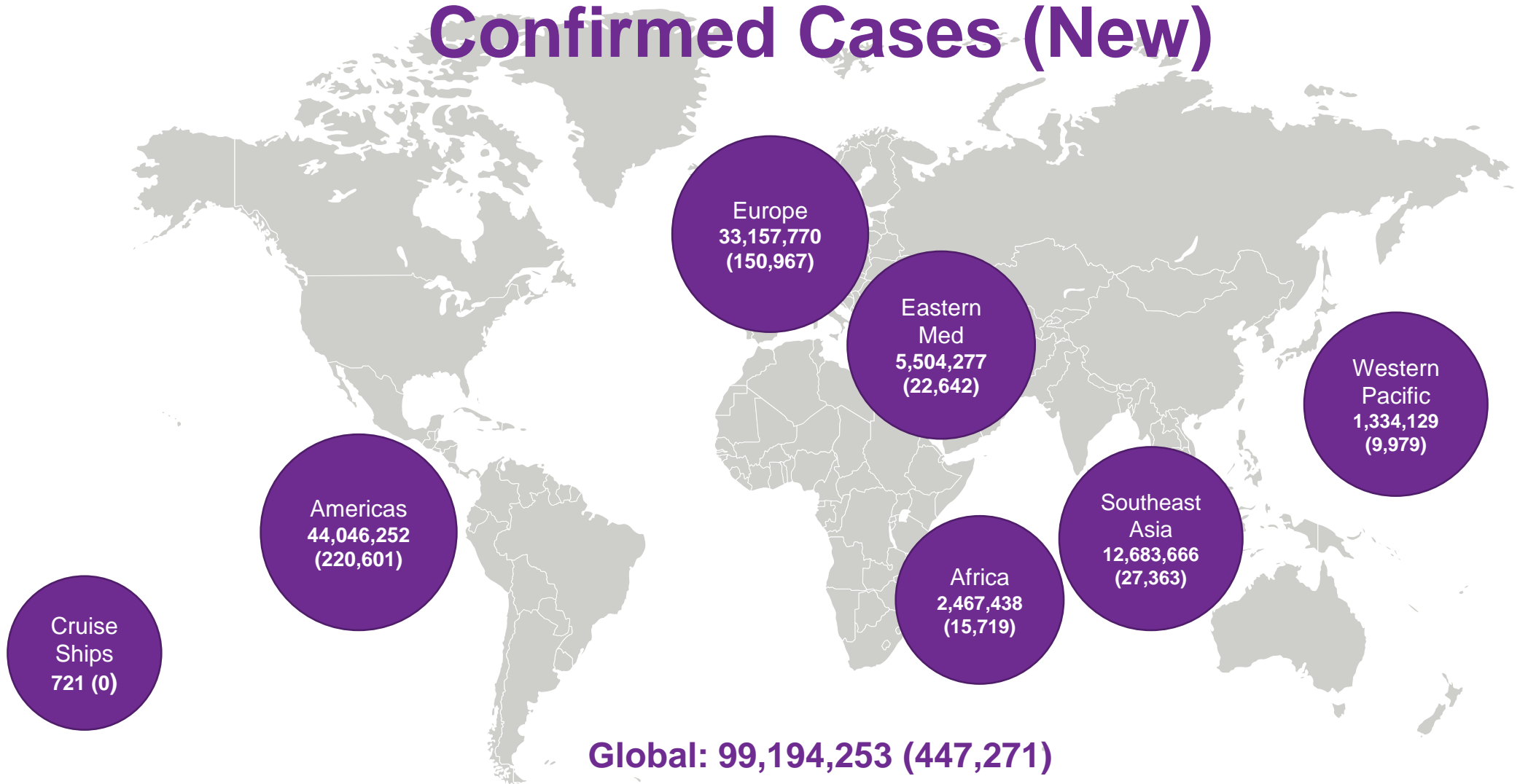

As of 2100 hours US EDT on January 24, 2021



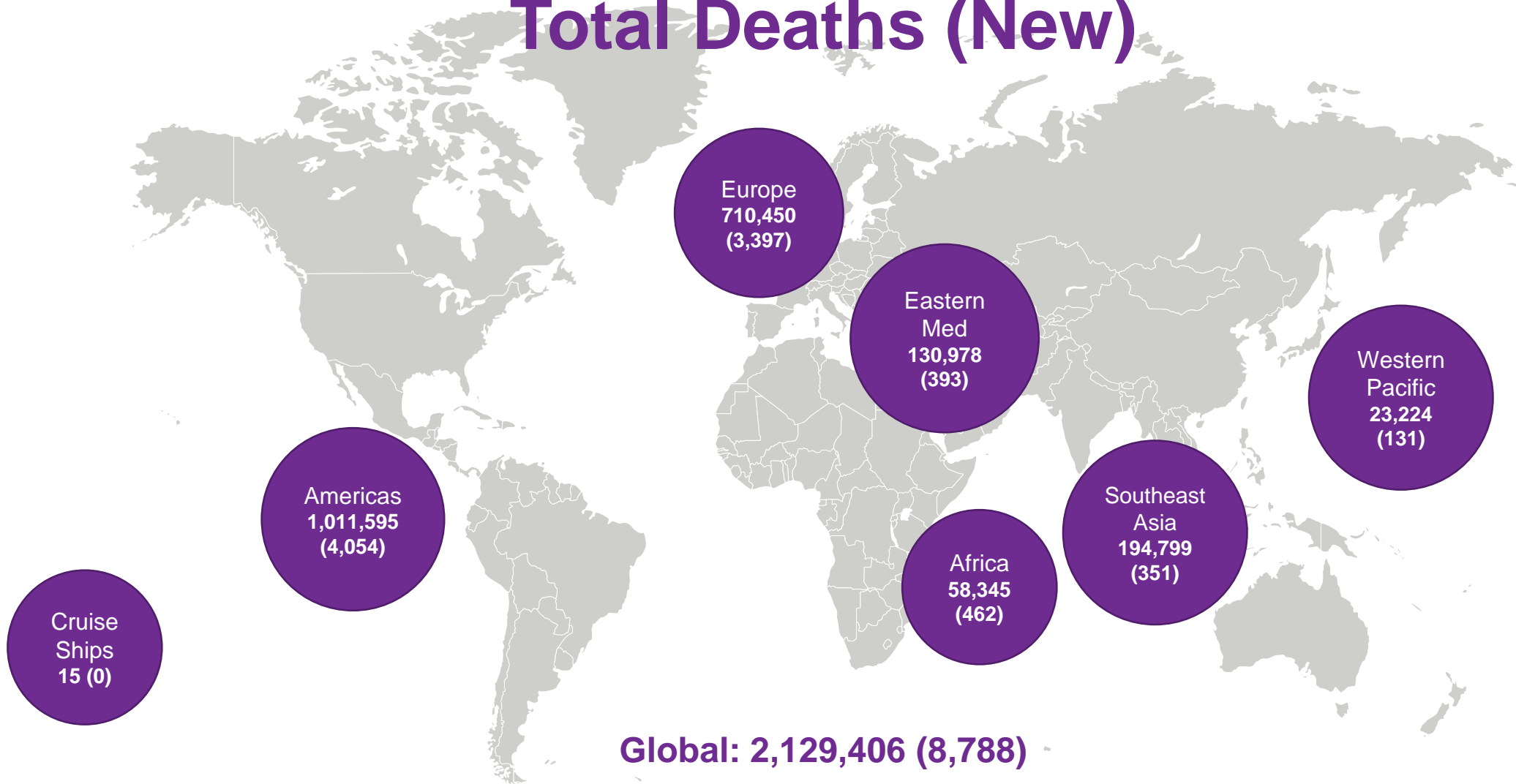
# Confirmed Cases (New)

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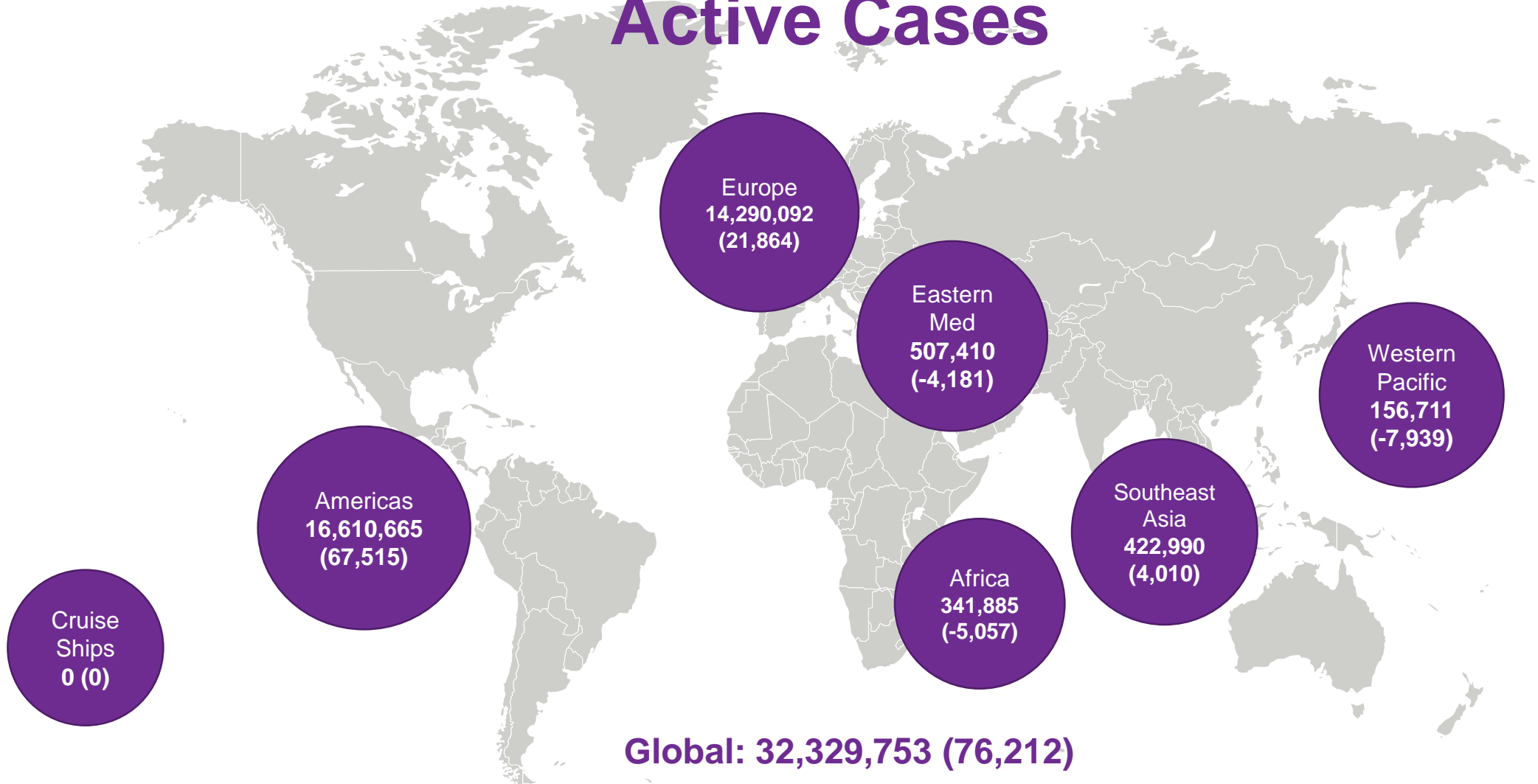
# Total Deaths (New)
